### WELFARE

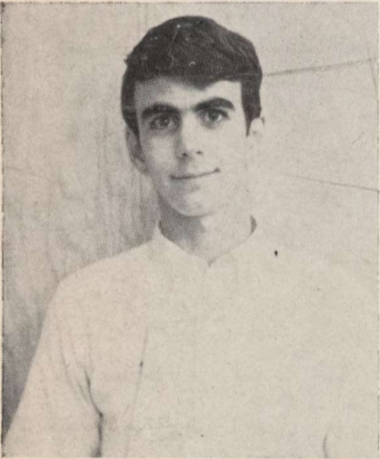


DOUG CAREY

If elected Commissioner of Welfare, Doug Carey would like to rejuvenate interest in the Welfare Board and would encourage more participation by upperclassmen.

He feels that "the effectiveness of the Welfare Board is up to the students. They must recognize the authority and obey it if the Board is going to benefit the student body at all."

Doug has been active in Woodside activities and feels that he is qualified for the office of Welfare Commissioner. He served on the Welfare Board last year and has been on the Finance Board for two years, this year in the capacity of captain. He is also State Treasurer of JSA and had a part in "The Tempest."

Paul Voakes, candidate for the office of Commissioner of Welfare, feels his 4.0 grade average is one of his major qualifications for the job.

Paul has talked with the present commissioner, Bill Heffin, about the many responsibilities of the Welfare Board, and will continue to do so.

According to Paul, "The shortcomings in the Welfare Board at present result from the lack of cooperation between the students and the Welfare Board members." Because the board is so understaffed now, he favors "expansion of the board, along with more competent members." Paul also feels that Student Court should not be burdened with "trivial punishments which can be administered by the Welfare Board itself."

### FINANCE

If elected Finance Commissioner, Mike Monteith would work hard with the other Commissioners to make next year as successful as possible.

He would like to organize a larger, revitalized student store with a greater variety of stock and an after-school snack cart which would be permanent facility.

He would also like to obtain more advantages for student body card holders, and if elected, he would work during the summer to obtain student discounts from local merchants. He would also organize extensive sales of student body cards during the first three weeks of school "to return to our 90+ percentile rank in student body card sales."

Mike has served for three years on the Finance Board and for two years on the Student Council Fiscal Control Committee which assists in setting up the budget. He has also served as a treasurer of JSA.

Toby Plough is the convention nominee for the office of Finance Commissioner. If elected, he would like to offer a greater variety of foods in the after-school snack cart, and a larger quantity of stock in the student store.

He feels that such events as the La Crosse match in May are excellent for increasing the school treasury, and if elected, he would like to organize more such events next year.

In Student Council this year, Toby was one of the supporters of the bill to give financial support to Woodside clubs. He pointed out, however, that this would be im-

possible without more fund-raising activities next year.

He feels that he gained valuable experience for the Commission-ship when he kept the books last summer for a shop which had \$4000 worth of merchandise.

### SOCIAL ACTIVITIES

Annabell Callaghan, Primary Election candidate for Social Commissioner, has been an active member of the Social Board in her freshman and sophomore years at Woodside. She served as co-chairman of the refreshment committee last year and was chairman of the entertainment committee for the four dances the Social Board has sponsored this year.

If elected, she would like to organize a larger variety of dances and would look into the possibility of a computer dance. She pointed out that "the board needs to know what kind of dances the students want and if they are satisfied with the ones they have."

Annabell would like to work more closely with the class boards, especially the freshman and sophomore, since they had trouble putting on their dances this year.

Sherry McLaren was nominated for Commissioner of Social and Cultural Activities at last Saturday's convention. She feels that the Social Board should hold more all-school dances, and that they should have more originality.

If elected, she would like to see a greater membership on the board so that more work could be done on the dances.

Sherry is secretary of the Junior Class this year and a member of the Drill Team.

## Student Senate Amendment To Be On Election Ballot

The Student Senate Amendment will be on the ballot in the Final Election on Thursday and Friday. If it is passed, the student legislative body will be reduced to 20 members, five elected senators from each class level. This will hopefully increase the efficiency of the legislative group.

The class board representative in each basic course class will read Student Senate minutes, and on issues of concern to the general Student Body, special noon meetings of the Senate will be held. At this time, any member of the Student Body will be able to comment on Student Senate action. Any student may also introduce written legislation to the Senate.

Contrary to the general impression of several students, if the Senate proves to be unsatisfactory next year, only 105 signatures are needed to allow the Student Body to vote on it again.

The major argument against the Student Senate Amendment is

that it will reduce direct representation of the Student Body in the legislative branch of school government and will result in oligarchy. It is felt that class representatives must be retained to insure the flow of ideas from the general Student Body to the student government.

Of the four amendments placed on the ballot in the Primary Election, two were passed. The Student Body voted to change the name of the Girls' Athletics Commission to Girls' Activities by a vote of 605 to 47. The amendment to make the Student Body Secretary an official appointive job was passed by a vote of 582 to 72.

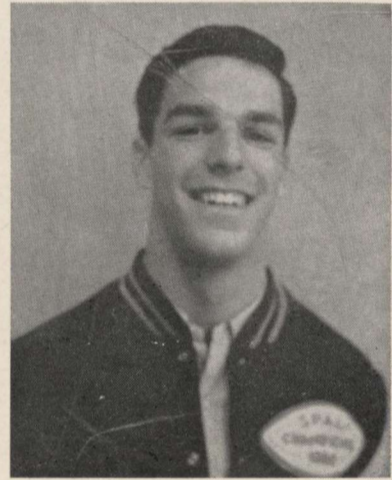
The amendment to eliminate the Commission of Publications was defeated by a vote of 422 to 227, and the ratification amendment which would allow ratification of constitutional amendments by a two-thirds vote of the Student Council was defeated, 350 to 286.

If elected Student Body President, Henry Klein would continue the ideas of the present administration under Joe Tiffany, and would also like to maintain the good relationship between the faculty and the students.

He will be talking extensively to Joe about the duties of the president and some legislation for next year.

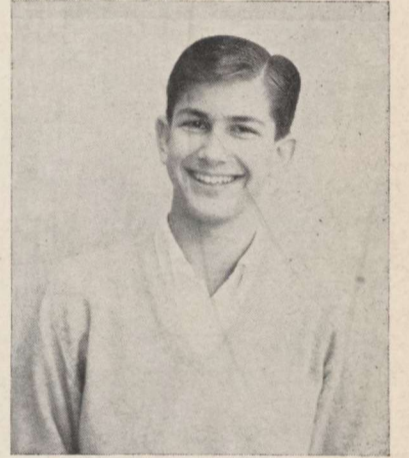
Henry supports the passage of

## PUBLICATIONS

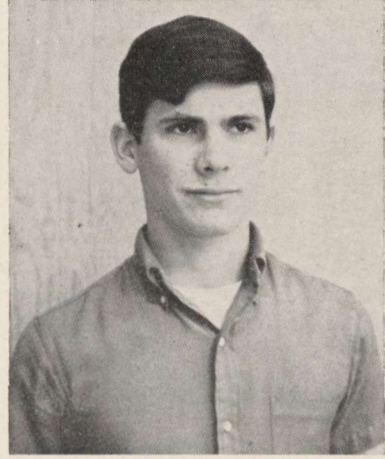

Debbie, who presently maintains a 3.8 grade average, feels that the six art courses she has taken in the past three years make her well qualified for the job of Publicity Commissioner.

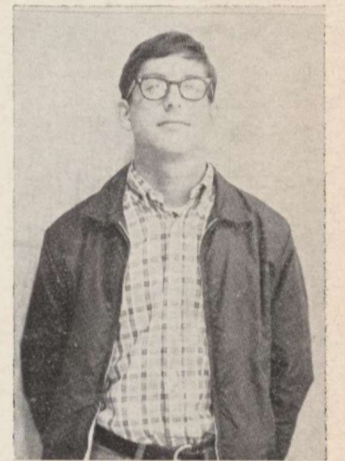
