To participate in the Zone Selection Event, the plaque winners had to discuss an unannounced subject related to their field before a panel of business and civic leaders. In the West Bay Zone, this took place April 13 at the Fairmont Hotel in San Francisco.

Scholastic achievement, citizenship, leadership and services, cooperation in group discussion, sound and logical thinking, and articulation and command of English were considered in the selection of winners.

Four-Part Poetry Series Concludes

Poets Shirley Kaufman, Eugene Lesser, and Nick Chavin from San Francisco entertained freshman and sophomore English classes and other Woodside poetry enthusiasts at their four poetry readings during 7th period and after school for the past four Thursdays.

The three poets, all doing graduate work in creative writing at San Francisco State College, read the students' poetry as well as their own. Besides writing poems for the New Yorker, Shirley Kaufman is presently in the process of writing a book.

Board Cuts Snack Bar Out

The present cafeteria and snack bar system will be discontinued in the Sequoia School District, which includes Woodside, next year. This is due to a Board of Trustees budget cut.

The changes in the lunch hour procedures are not yet known, except that everyone need either bring his own lunch or go out to lunch. As Mr. Bradley said, "Teachers and students alike must be pioneers and bring lunches in a brown paper bag."

Traffic Light Proposition Turned Down

Several months ago Joe Tiffany and Peter LeVine introduced a resolution to the Student Council that demanded a regulation to order traffic at the Churchill and Woodside Road intersection. So far, neither town administration nor highway patrol have reacted favorably.

The original proposition was to install a traffic light at the intersection which would work only shortly before and after school. This project failed because of financial reasons. The light would cost ten to fifteen thousand dollars, which would be far too high regarding its relatively short operation hours. In addition, there will be another traffic light at the intersection of Woodside Road and the new freeway from San Mateo.

The highway patrol turned down the suggestion to send one man before and after school. As a result of their failures, Tiffany and LeVine decided not to follow up on the project on their own. Instead, they assured the full support of the student body to any attempt by other instances, such as PTA to find a solution of the problems.

'Take Me Along' Performs To Full House

The performances of "Take Me Along" on May 5 and 6 were very successful. Friday night was a sell out with a total of 800 tickets sold for the week end.

AFS Applications Due This Month

Woodside's applicants for the American Field Service programs of study overseas, American Abroad, are filling out the necessary forms this month. In the past these were not requested until the fall in the midst of the furors of the beginning of school. Those sophomores and juniors interested in applying should get the information from their counselors.

The AFS Summer Program is for that season between the junior and senior years. The School Program may be in the junior, senior, or post-graduate years. School Program candidates spend approximately a year abroad living with a family and studying in a secondary school. Successful applicants for the Southern Hemisphere School Program will leave the USA about February 1968. Those going to the Northern Hemisphere or for the summer will depart about June 1969.

Deserving Seniors Receive Awards

Each year about \$4500 worth of scholarships are awarded to deserving Woodside seniors. The Woodside Scholarship Committee judges students eligible for such scholarships as PTA, Boosters, and CSF on citizenship, academic merit, and financial need.

Only 30 Cars Safe Hon. Mentions Win In Home Show

Only 30 cars out of 127 received safety stickers on Tuesday, May 2, when the California Highway Patrol conducted a car inspection. The highway patrol was looking for defects in headlights, windshield wipers, brakes, and they also inspected all car trunks. Most defects were found in headlight adjustment, with 78 cars cited.

Officer Fenlon of the CHP, will be here during the noon on Tuesday, May 16, to sign cards and issue stickers for those who did not pass the inspection.

Daryl Broadwater and Tom Morganson both won honorable mentions at the Home and Garden Show currently in progress in Oakland. Two Woodsiders received recognitions for models of bungalows, and Daryl won another honorable mention for her design.

Salveson Wins 4th In Science Fair

"Our generation must cope with a doubling of man's scientific knowledge within the next ten years. The time has come when scientists must be mass-produced with unique and creative skills to cope with the mass influx of knowledge."

The above is a statement by Larry Salveson, Woodside Senior, who won a fourth place in the San Francisco Bay Area Science Fair.

He added firmly, "Students are uninformed of Science 'goings-on'. I found out about the Science Fair in a local newspaper."

Larry's project was part of a larger project which he has been working on for a long time and will make his life's work.

"Structural Analysis of Electron Orbitals' is the first phase of what possibly may be a life long project entitled 'Computer Predicting Chemical Reactions'. Presently, only evidence exists that the theory is possible, it may never be completed. If completed, the systems of equations should be able to computer predict any chemical reaction."

In conclusion he added "Teachers won't go out of their way to get students interested. An interested student must fight for information. A teacher's job is to stir up interest, and the teachers are failing!"

Wildcats Win 6 Straight; Shoot For Seventh Today

It was a pitching dual all the way, as Woodside barely squeaked past a tough Palo Alto squad 1-0, for the fifth straight victory this season. With this victory the Wildcats were able to move into fourth place with a record of 5-4.

The scoreless deadlock was broken in the top of the seventh inning, when with one out, Rick Betchley singled and reached second on a pass ball. After Mike Cocco walked and Dick Balocco was hit by a pitch which loaded the bases, second baseman Cullen Smith sacrificed Betchley in from third with the tie-breaking run.

Pitching superb shut-out ball for Woodside was junior Charlie Brennan. Brennan, who at the beginning of the season was hindered with an injury to his pitching arm, showed no ill-effects of the injury. He did not allow a single Palo Alto runner to score, while holding the Cougars to only three hits, and striking out ten.

Senior Barry Woodruff pitched the final frame for the Wildcats, striking out two of the last three Cougar batters he faced.

Pitching was a major factor throughout the entire contest, at the Wildcats were able to collect only four hits, all of which were singles.

Last Thursday in a game against Carlmont, Woodside defeated the Scots by the score of 6-3. Woodside, led by the hitting of Don Bunce and Cullen Smith's early scoring, piled up a 5-1 lead going into the top of the third inning.

Bunce, batting leadoff against the Scots, collected a double and a single, batted in one run, and scored two runs himself. Second baseman Cullen Smith smashed a triple and a single and collected one RBI.

Woodside's final run of the game came in the sixth inning as Dick Balocco reached first base on a walk, was moved to second on an error and scored when pitcher Tom Barrett singled for the final hit of the game.

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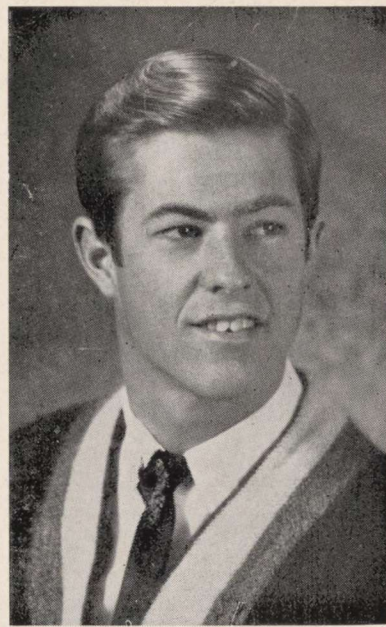
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Barry Woodruff Busy Athlete

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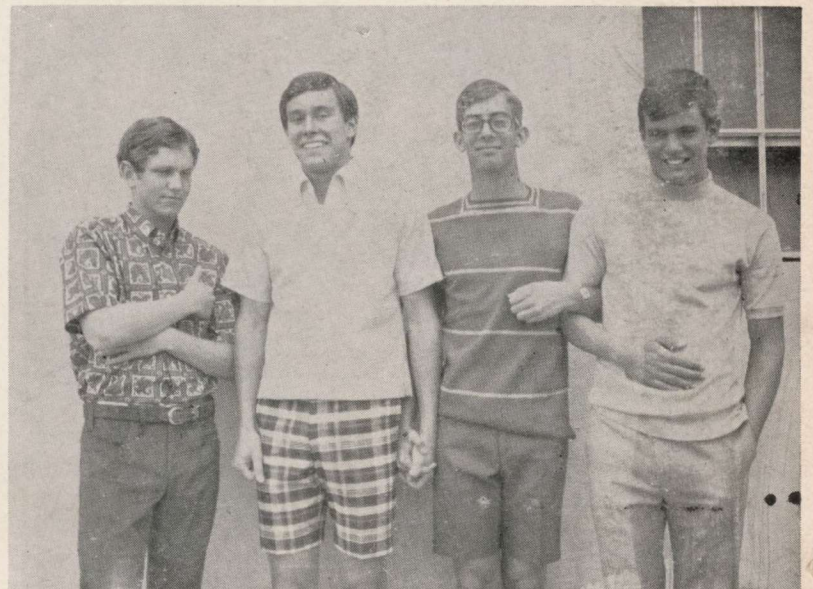
